Year group: 7	Subject: Art

Rationale	Throughout the project, students are going to be learning about British wildlife and conservation as well as exploring a range of media and processes. The project will focus on the artist, Mark Hearld, who works in a range of media, culminating in collages which combine painting, drawing and printmaking. The students will also learn how artists like Mark Hearld, establish their craft and expand their creativity to appeal to a wider audience - linking this to careers in illustration and fine arts. The project builds upon the students' prior knowledge in colour theory and painting techniques and introduces them to new processes like poly-tile printing. Students will be more responsible for their work spaces and the direction of their project, encouraging more independence and collaborative work. The final outcome will be a piece which demonstrates a range of skills and showcases their strongest elements from the project as they learn to identify and select successes from their explorations with a range of media.
