Prior learning - linked to National curriculum	 The end of term pupil voice from July 2024 found that: 30% of students could not explain what is meant by power in relationships. 70% of students are not confident in their knowledge of coercive control. 40% of students are not sure of the term relationship choices. 40% of students are unaware of the consequences that can occur from ending a relationship. 70% of learners were unsure how the impact grief can have upon a family. 70% of students are unable to explain what lust means. 		
Rationale	This unit seeks to build upon learners' prior knowledge of relationships and is one of the final units of the RSE curriculum. Students will develop their knowledge of different types of family structures and the changing responsibilities of different family members. This also includes how family dynamics can change due to unforeseen circumstances such as; unexpected pregnancy, bereavement, relationship breakdown and miscarriages or abortion. Focus is placed upon the laws around forced marriage and honnor based violence as well as the different marriage ceremonies that can take place and those that are considered legally binding. This unit supports students to build their resilience and understanding of how to manage and cope with change as well as providing clear signposts into where to get support both within and outside of school.
