Year group 7	Subject: Darkwood Manor			
Prior learning- linked to National Curriculum	Building on knowledge that they have managed to obtain in terms 3 and 4, the students are now much more acutely aware of the processes in creating performance. They have established theatre rules, they are aware of how to hold themselves when performing and proper theatre etiquette, and they also know some theatre history and a little more about how performances have evolved in this country over the last few centuries!			
Rationale	Teaching year 7 the basics in physical theatre and the creation of tension in performance; as well as teaching them the basics of storytelling and working together to create pieces of work. This gives them a head start on the devising process, which is a staple of the drama curriculum at key stages 3,4 and 5 and also helps the students to think creatively - which is beneficial across subjects at ks3 and 4.			
Vocabulary:	Keywords: Tension, Physicality, Body as Object, Stimulus, Devising, Body Language, Facial Expression, Levels, Pace, Tone, Pitch, status.			
Cultural Capital:	Giving students the opportunities and the outlet for creating their own stories using a theme as a stimulus. Giving them the chance to use their imaginations to find stories in everyday things.
