Uniform

It has been a pleasure to welcome all students back this term. Can we remind you of our uniform and equipment expectations, students arriving and leaving the school are representing PCS and must arrive and leave in full school uniform.

Blazers must also be worn whilst at school whether that is in lessons, break or lunch. They may only be removed if the students are given permission by their teacher. Please take the time to correct any uniform concerns or issues during the half-term break.

Here are the expectations of our students uniform;

Blazers - All students need to wear the PCS blazer.

Jumpers - Students can wear a plain, black, V-neck jumper with no logo. Round-neck jumpers are not allowed.

Skirts -Students can wear trousers or skirts. If wearing a skirt, this

All skirts should not be rolled or folded over at the top and should not be shorter than four inches (10cm) above the knee.

Tights - If wearing a skirt, students should wear either plain black tights or white socks or black socks but not both tights and socks. If socks are worn they should not have any obvious logos on them.

Shirts -Should be tucked in at the waist and can be long or short-sleeved. Only the top button can be undone.

Hair - Natural in colour and not extreme in style.

Ties - Should reach the waistband of your trousers or skirts. They should be fastened close to the neck but not so tightly that they cannot be undone.

Trousers - Should be smart, black 'school trousers'. Trousers cannot be chinos or black jeans. **They can not be skinny trousers.**

Jewellery - Students can wear one simple ring per hand. One pair of small earrings. Once simple bracelet and one watch.

Makeup - In years 7 and 8 makeup and nail varnish are not allowed. This includes false eyelashes. Students will be asked to remove makeup if it is visible. Students are not allowed to wear fake nails such as acrylic or gel nails. They will be asked to remove them before attending lessons. Piercing and tattoos are not allowed other than one pair of stud earrings (1 earring per ear) in total.

Makeup - In Years 9-11 minimal makeup is allowed but nail varnish is not. This means no lipstick, false eyelashes or excessive makeup. Students are also not allowed to wear fake nails such as acrylic or gel nails. They will be asked to remove them before attending lessons. Piercings and tattoos are not allowed other than one pair of stud earrings in total.

Mobile Phones - Are not allowed between the hours of 8.30am and 3pm on the school site. Students should not have earphones. If a student is seen using their phone by a member of staff, they will be asked to hand it into reception.

Please see our Trust-wide mobile phone policy

It is also vitally important that all students arrive at school with all their equipment. This includes a pen, pencil, ruler, pencil case, and reading book.

State the Functions A: Blood cell production

Analyse each function explaining its role and importance

The bone marrow of the skeletal system produces red and white blood cells. This is a vital role for the skeleton as the red blood cells circulate oxygen around the body so that we can move and digest food, then carry carbon dioxide to our lungs, so we can exhale it.

This is important as we need oxygen so that we have energy, and we need to breathe out carbon dioxide as too much of it can damage muscles and tissue. The white blood cells that are produced fight infections and any foreign substances that end up in the body.

If we didn't have white blood cells then we would be much more susceptible to illness and disease.

A: Movement

The skeleton's complex structure makes it easy for humans to move and talk. The joints in our hips, knees, and ankles make it easy for us to walk, run and kick a ball; the

An example of this would be when you are lifting weights, your bicep, which is attached to both the scapula and the radius, will contract whilst it is tensed, and your tricep will relax.

A: Protection of vital organs Protecting important organs such as the heart and brain is the axial skeleton. This part of the skeletal system ensures that when someone bangs into something or falls, the vital body parts we need to survive, remain undamaged. For example, when playing a physical sport like rugby, a player would win the ball by barging into the opponents; if it wasn't for the cranium protecting the brain, then the tackling player could end up with, possibly fatal, brain damage.

Having a sedentary lifestyle has many risks associated with it, a person has an increased risk of heart disease, hypertension, and type 2 diabetes. They may develop a poor sleeping pattern and increase the risk of lethargy and exhaustion. A sedentary lifestyle can also lead to obesity and can damage self-esteem and a decrease in desire to exercise, obesity can reduce a person's cardiovascular endurance, speed, power, agility, and flexibility. They are also less likely to perform for a long period of time. This may also affect your mental and social health, obese people are more likely to suffer from depression. Increased weight can also put pressure on joints, causing other health conditions.






